COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course comprises a three week clinical practicum at an assigned facility. Students will be exposed to a clinical setting and preliminary opportunities for application of didactic course work. Emphasis will be placed on the development of communication and interpersonal skills in the clinical setting, as well as documentation and physical therapy skills and procedures that have been introduced in classes.

Prerequisite: Admission into the Entry Level DPT Degree Program in Physical Therapy & Rehabilitation Sciences and successful completion of one semester of the curriculum.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

A. GLOBAL OBJECTIVES

Upon completion of this clinical practicum, the student will be able to:

1. **access** information for effective communicate and information sharing within the clinical setting.
2. **document** the results of a treatment/evaluation that they participated in, utilizing the SOAP format.
3. **establish** rapport and positive interpersonal relationships with clinical instructor, other staff, physicians, patients and families, compatible with increased clinical experience.
4. **display** confidence, empathy and professionalism appropriate for this clinical rotation.
5. **exhibit** behaviors commensurate with the APTA Code of Ethics.
6. **utilize** the skills presented in Professional Interactions, Physical Therapy Documentation, Physical Therapy Tests & Measures, Basics of Acute Care Physical Therapy, Applied Kinesiology and Biomechanics, and Pathophysiology and Advanced Topics in Human Anatomy (PTRS 701, 702, 703, 704, 710, 711, & 712).
7. **practice** in a safe manner that minimizes risk to patient, self and other team members.

B. UNIT OBJECTIVES

Unit 1. Communication Skills

Upon completion of this clinical practicum the student will be able to:

- a. **communicate** effectively with clinical instructor and staff.
- b. **listen** and **respond** appropriately to patients and co-workers.
- c. **utilize** medical terminology and acceptable abbreviations and acronyms for verbal and written communication.
- d. **assist** with one initial evaluation report utilizing standard forms for the respective facilities.
- e. **access** appropriate information from the medical record to facilitate initial and progress documentations.
- f. **draft** one progress report utilizing standard forms for the respective facilities.

Unit 2. Interpersonal Relationships

Upon completion of this clinical practicum the student will be able to:

- a. **establish** appropriate rapport and relationships with the clinical instructor and other staff.
- b. **introduce** one's self to patient and family.
- c. **establish** an individual patient/family rapport by carrying on an appropriate conversation.
- d. **contribute** positively to intra-departmental relationships by relaying pertinent information on patient progress during meetings.
- e. **recognize** the responsibilities of a student within the clinical structure.
- f. **develop** a realistic attitude about his/her responsibilities and abilities.

Unit 3. Personal and Professional Qualities

Upon completion of this clinical practicum the student will be able to:

- a. **convey** through verbal behavior the impression that he/she understands a particular situation.
- b. **demonstrate** appropriate judgment in terms of establishing/performing treatment skills.
- c. **display** use of a systematic approach to problem-solving, negotiation or conflict management when needed.
- d. **demonstrate** appropriate judgment in terms of patient confidentiality and preliminary risk management issues.
- e. **exhibit** appropriate, professional appearance and attire for the clinical setting.
- f. **be** punctual and prepared for the practicum.

Unit 4. Physical Therapy Skills

Upon completion of this clinical practicum and when given an opportunity the student will begin to gain physical therapy skills by being able to:

- a. **participate** in the application of the principles of infection control and sterile technique within the clinical setting when indicated.
- b. **apply** proper body mechanics within all realms of the clinical setting.
- c. **perform** the basic assessment features of a physical therapy evaluation.

- d. **demonstrate** confidence in the prescription and **instruction** of appropriate transfer methods.
- e. **demonstrate** understanding of the safe use of tubes and ostomies in clinical settings.
- f. **practice** safety precautions to self, staff, and patients at all times.
- g. **utilize** the tilt table within the clinical setting when indicated and relevant to the respective facility.
- h. **accurately measure** joint range of motion.
- i. **position** patients in a variety of situations as indicated by their diagnoses.
- j. **apply** physical therapy techniques to reduce the effects of immobilization on a patient.
- k. **measure** muscle strength using a manual muscle test.
- l. **participate** in the prescription of appropriate wheelchair and gait assistive devices when indicated.
- m. **apply** differential diagnosis knowledge gained in pathophysiology from the molecular level to total human body function.

PROFESSIONAL BEHAVIOR:

Any behavior exhibited by the student deemed inappropriate by the ACCE or Clinical Instructor of Clinical Center Coordinator may result in failure of this course.

GRADING CRITERIA: This course is graded satisfactory or unsatisfactory. To receive a satisfactory grade in this course the following are required:

- * Score at 90% of entry level competency on the first 5 criteria of the CPI at the final evaluation and have a cumulative score of 15% of entry level competence on the last 19 items.
- * Complete and turn in a patient progress note
- * Complete the student self-assessment and skills list and return to ACCE
- * Develop personal goals/learning objectives for the rotation
- * Complete the student evaluation of the clinical facility and return to ACCE

ALL OF THE ABOVE MATERIALS MUST BE TURNED IN NO LATER THAN 5:00PM FRIDAY, DECEMBER 31, 2004. FAILURE TO DO SO WILL RESULT IN A FAILING GRADE.

It should be noted that because of the timing of the clinic and the stop date for grades, all students will receive an "I" as the grade for the course. Once your paperwork has been turned in, the grade will be changed to the appropriate Satisfactory/Unsatisfactory grade. Students who does not receive satisfactory grade in this practicum will not be eligible to continue with subsequent clinical practica until this is repeated and satisfactorily grade is obtained.

Remediation Statement:

The student will need to meet with the Academic Coordinator of Clinical Education to discuss and develop a plan for repeating this clinical practicum prior to continuing with subsequent clinical education courses.
